A haiku is a short poem with a set structure. The purpose of a haiku is to describe an event, object, or scene with as few words as possible so the reader can bring it to life in their own mind.

APRIL 17TH

April 17th, is the day the whole world honors haiku as international haiku poetry day!

JAPAN

The haiku first emerged in Japanese literature during the 17th century as a terse reaction to elaborate poetic traditions, though it did not become known by the name haiku until the 19th century.

MATSUO BASHO

Matsuo Basho (1644-1694) is generally regarded as the father of haiku poetry, the man who took a popular and often irreverant verse form similar to todays limerick, and raised it to the level of serious art.

5-7-5

A haiku is an untuned poetic form consisting of 17 syllables arranged in 3 lines of 5, 7 and 5 syllables.
